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What is LEED

- An OECD Committee created 32 years ago to focus on:
 - Job creation
 - Cross-cutting issues connecting employment, skills and economic development
 - Policy implementation
- Expansion from 13 to 36 countries, including non OECD countries (e.g. Romania)
- A connection with practitioners: Forum on Partnerships and Local Development: over 2600 members in 53 countries



The context: dramatic increase of youth unemployment

Youth unemployment rate during the crisis, 15-24 years old



Local partnerships to support youth

- Remove barriers to joined-up approaches
- Get incentives and the way success is measured right
- Improve data availability and data sharing
- Analyse skills shortages to determine their causes
- Engage employers
- Implement through strong multi-level coordination



Local partnerships to support youth (1)

- Removing barriers to joined-up approaches:
 - Flexibility in policy management
 - Building career clusters and mapping pathways
 - Information sharing between agencies



Local partnerships to support youth (2)

- Get incentives and the way success is measured right:
 - Review your funding models to avoid competition and creaming
 - Reward schools for tracking school leavers destinations



Local partnerships to support youth (3)

- Improve data availability and data sharing:
 - Build intelligence based on tracking
 - Agree on a shared diagnostic
 - Share a comprehensive map of services



Local partnerships to support youth (4)

- Analyse skills shortages to determine their causes:
 - A low-paid job can be good start if it allows to progress
 - Low-skills equilibrium can be detrimental to economic resilience and job quality



Local partnerships to support youth (5)

- Engaging employers
 - Ensure that firms invest in their future workforce ...
 - ... while finding a good balance between short term employers' needs with the long-term need to equip individuals with a broader set of transferable skills



Local partnerships to support youth (6)

- Strong multi-level coordination
 - Build a private-public-people partnership
 - Divide governance tasks between national, regional and local



- Inject flexibility in the management of programmes
- Build data and intelligence
- Establish clear roles and responsabilities at each governance level
- Involve employers and youth groups
- Establish intermediaries
- Take an integrated approach to skills supply and demand
